GENERAL RULES

- 1. This flower show conforms to the standards established by National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC). The Handbook for Flower Shows (HB), 2017 Edition, with revisions printed in the National Gardener Magazine (TNG), is the authority for all issues not covered by the schedule, which is the law of the show.
- 2. Exhibits must be submitted by 7:00 pm April 10, 2020, by email to Robin Benson.
- 3. No photoshopping or retouching allowed!
- 4. Photo cropping is permitted.
- 5. All horticulture and design classes are open to growers and designers who are members of Beverley Hills Garden Club.
- 6. Each exhibit will be reviewed for conformity to the schedule prior to judging. Final determination for conformance is the judges' responsibility.
- 7. The decisions of the judges are final. Awards may be withheld if not merited.
- 8. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per class, except in the Horticulture Division.
- 9. The NGC Standard System of Awarding is used in all divisions.
 - Only one (1) first place (blue) ribbon per class or subclass. must score 90 points or more
 - Only one (1) second place (red) ribbon per class or subclass. must score 85 points or more
 - Only one (1) third place (yellow) ribbon per class or subclass. must score 80 points or more
 - One (1) or more Honorable Mention (white) ribbons as merited;
 must score 75 points or more

DIVISION I: HORTICULTURE RULES

- 1. All horticulture exhibits must be fresh.
- 2. All entries must have been grown by the exhibitor.
- 3. Plant material must be in its natural state and may not be altered by application (treatment) of oil, commercial "shine" products, etc., that change the natural appearance. No wiring of specimens is permitted.
- 4. Only foliage and/or flowers naturally grown and still attached to the specimen are permitted.

- 5. All plant material must have been in the possession of the exhibitor the appropriate number of days as listed in the chart on page 55 of the Handbook for Flower Shows, 2017.
- 6. The rules for a single species cut or container-grown specimen are listed in the Handbook for Flower Shows or its supplement Horticulture Exhibiting and Judging.
- 7. Cut specimens should not have foliage below the water line, except for Gladiolus.
- 8. If an entry is considered a flowering plant, it should be exhibited as a flowering specimen. Foliage plants may flower but should be exhibited as foliage plants if they are grown for their leaves.
- 9. Specimens with a class designation in the schedule may not be entered in the "Other" class.
- 10. Cut specimens must be displayed in clear green glass bottles of suitable size and stability provided by the exhibitor. Wedging is permitted, as needed, but must not detract from the specimen. Bubble wrap, provided by the exhibitor, is to be used for wedging.
- 11. The Scales of Points for Horticulture is in the Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 14.
- 12. An exhibitor may submit more than one entry per class if each is a different species, variety, cultivar, type or color.
- 13. Number of entries permitted per exhibitor is ten.

Section G. Collection: A group of five different cut and named specimens that have a common characteristic, displayed in individual green glass



DIVISION II: DESIGN RULES

- 1. Some plant material must be used in every exhibit. This includes fresh and/or dried plant material.
- 2. Exhibitor may enter multiple classes within the Design Division, but only one (1) exhibit per class.
- 3. The exhibit entered competition must be the work of only one (1) exhibitor.
- 4. A single flower is not a design. Container-grown plants are fresh plant material and are permitted in the Design Division where appropriate, but they are never considered floral design.
- 5. Landscapes, scenes or anything representing an actual item of clothing, person, animal, etc., are not considered acceptable in the Design Division.
- 6. Religious symbols used in a design must be displayed in a respectful manner.
- 7. To educate the public, plant material used in the design must be listed in the email submission.
- 8. When design techniques are required, they must be listed on a card.
- 9. Plant material and non-plant material permitted and not permitted in the Design Division are printed in the Handbook for Flower Shows, pages 80-81.
- 10. The exhibitor is required to conform to the stated description and limitations of the Design Type if named in the class
- 11. The Scale of Points for Design is listed in the Handbook for Flower Shows, page 130.

DIVISION I I: Design



Section A. Open: "Here Comes the Sun"

Parallel Design

A design consisting of three or more groupings of plant material and optional components with a strong parallel placement in a single container or base. As defined by the *NCG Handbook for Flower Shows*, page 75. Space: 30" wide x 30" deep



Section B. NJSA: "Octopus's Garden"

Underwater Design

A creative design having some or all of the plant material and other optional components submerged in water, as defined by the *NCG Handbook for Flower Shows*, page 79.

Space: 30" wide x 30" deep
